## *Knights' action line*

**The Great Outdoors**— Books of drawing tickets for The Great Outdoors, the annual fall raffle sponsored by Ohio Council to benefit Catholic education in the state, are being placed in Knights' church mailboxes.

Grand Knight Charlie Tagliareni requested that Knights either sell or purchase the books of tickets. Cost is \$1 per ticket or \$5 for a book of six tickets. "Our Council has to account for each book," he reminded. November 2 is the deadline for turning in tickets for the Nov. 9 drawing.

**The battle continues** — Although the U.S. Senate failed to generate the votes necessary to override President Bill Clinton's veto of HR 1833, the partial abortion ban act, Right To Life advocates have vowed to continue the battle.

The Senate vote followed a U.S. House vote, which did generate votes needed to overthrow the presidential veto. A two-thirds vote to override the veto is necessary in both legislative bodies.

**Adoration/First Saturday Mass** — November adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will be held Nov. 1-2 with First Saturday Mass sponsored by Seton Knights to follow at 9 a.m. Nov. 2. Remember, Nov. 1 is a Holy Day of Obligation, and Nov. 2 is All Souls Day when Catholics make a special effort to pray for souls in purgatory.

**Successful outing** — A family picnic for Knights and guests held Sunday, Oct. 6 at Victory Park proved successful as approximately 40 persons attended, reported Chairman Joe Rossi. Knights supplied meat and soft drinks. Games included basketball and volleyball.

**Many thanks** — Charlie Tagliareni, co-chairman of the food committee at the recent Seton Parish festival, thanked Knights who assisted with food clean-up beginning at 8:30 during the three evenings of the festival. "Our council also owes a special thanks to Sue McKenna, wife of Knight Dave McKenna, for the help she provided," Tagliareni noted.

## **Pasta dinner scheduled; workers needed 2 days**

The third annual pasta dinner sponsored by Seton Knights will be held Sunday, Oct. 27 in Bishop Herrmann Hall beginning after the 11:30 a.m. Mass and continuing until 7:30 p.m. Cost is \$5 for adults and \$3 for children under age 12.

**Co-chairmen Charlie Tagliareni and Bob Snider announced dinner preparation, including cooking pasta — penne rigate — will begin at noon Saturday, Oct. 26 and will continue until approximately 7 p.m.**

Dinner preparation will resume following the 8:30 a.m. Sunday Mass. "We need two shifts of workers Saturday and at least three on Sunday," Tagliareni said. In addition to pasta and meatballs, the dinner will include garlic bread baked by the Knights and salad, soft drinks, iced tea and coffee. Knights also will offer beer for a donation.

**"We have new 'wrinkle' this year — a separate service area for those who want carry-out dinners." In prior years, those who wanted carry-outs, had to wait in line with those eating in Bishop Herrmann Hall.**

"Also, we will flow our Herrmann Hall guests through a service line directly in front of the kitchen. We used that system for last two dinners and found it worked well," Tagliareni concluded.

## **Knights continue efforts to form own golf league**
