Steve Mallot also wanted everyone to know about Pickerington Central HS putting on the play, Dead Serious About Life. It will be at 3pm the same Sunday, and all should see it. Steve is excited that the Squire program is creating future Knights and thanks everyone for all their help. Wayne wants us to support this event for the squires.

Respect Life: Ed Chinnock stated that the committee went caroling this past weekend at the Senior Center and had a great time.

The trip to DC is still short of people for the bus. Mike Croyle stated 10 people have confirmed and 15 Spy kids are supposed to go. 10 other people have not paid yet. They might have to raise the fee if they can't get enough people to go. Ed stated that the mass at the Cathedral has been bumped up an hour, and to let everyone know. Ed has gone 11 times and it is truly a great trip.

Blue Coat Dinner: No update. Wayne stated more info next month.

Report of Standing Committee's:

Kroger Cares: Terry stated we do not qualify for the new Kroger program, so we will be ending it this month. We are a 501C3 charity not a 501C8 charity as required by Kroger.

Magnet Sales: Mike Phillips stated we started the year with 14,930 magnets and have sold 7,488 so far. We have 163 clings left. There are 639 magnets on order that we are waiting for checks, and the 18th of December is the last day Mike can ship the magnets out before Christmas.

Communications: No Report

Unfinished Business:

Steve Mallot asked about the musician who was supposed to give a concert at the Church. He wanted to find out the status. Mr. Hawkins is working with Pandora to set this up, and is working on the schedule to get him here to perform.

New Business:

Right to Life Support: George Schneider made a motion to have the council spend \$XXX to the seminarians to go on the Right to Life trip. Seconded by Ed Chinnock. Discussion-Steve Mallot asked how many of the seminarians are going on the trip. There are 112 scheduled to go on 2 buses set up by the Josephenum.

Our donation would help with the cost. Mike Croyle offered space on our bus if needed, and Mike will call Brian O'Conner to let them know. The discussion ended and the motion passed.

Easter Egg Hunt: Mike Phillips brought up to the Council that Roberta Wendt of the Seton Mom's Group wanted the Knights to take over the annual Easter Egg Hunt. She was not going to be able to run it this year and was hoping we could run it for her. Steve Mallot stated the Squires would be interested in doing this, and to have the information sent to him. Mike Phillips is going to get the information to Steve.

Choir: Pandora needs Men to sign up for the Seton Choir, and anyone interested should get with her.

Assistance Needed: Brother Glen stated that another fellow Knight Ed Loch wants to come to the monthly meetings, but needs someone to drive him to and from the meeting. He is in a motorized wheelchair, and would need 1-2 helpers to get him in a regular van or car. Mike Croyle asked if someone could contact Ed or his family, and use their van with a lift. If it is available, we should be able to get someone to come and get him to the meetings. Glen stated he will check this option for us.

Portsmouth: Frank Hare stated the Portsmouth donation might be already in the budget from last year. Frank Piper started to search for the info immediately. Frank supports the \$XXX donation, and a motion was made by Wayne to supply these funds. Seconded by Glen, and the motion was discussed. Frank Piper stated that in 2007 we had made a \$XXX donation but nothing last year. Motion was voted on and passed. Wayne will get the check to Tracy this week. Frank Hare stated it will help with the program goals.

St. Josephs Home: John Letourneau spoke to the Council on providing ongoing support to the St. Josephs home in Westerville. It is group living set up for 8 mentally and physically challenged women. It is a 24 hr staff care facility. John stated that the facility director could come in at a later time for more information. It was established in 1976, and they are not asking for a monetary donation. They need help on upkeep and maintenance of the facility and grounds. They would like us to help them out when needed or for special projects. Steve Mallot asked if there were any facilities in our location that might have the same need. If so we should help them first. Wayne stated we have asked around this area, and there is not one close by. Mark Knight suggested more information about the program be put in the monthly newsletter, and John said he would get it in.

Fish Fry: John Letourneau made a motion for \$XXXX fund request for all 5 of the fish fries. This money has been budgeted, so a vote only needed to be done. There was a second from Steve Mallot. No Discussion, and the motion was approved.

Estate Planning: Frank Piper stated that he spoke to Father Jim about holding an estate planning night at the church with our Field Agent. Father agreed, but made it clear that there was to be no selling of any kind. He simply wants information to be given and that is it.

Wayne stated the 1st pancake breakfast was down in sales, but he wanted to make a motion that a portion of all the pancake breakfast profit go to vocations. This way we can advertise the breakfasts and even the fish fries as a true charity event. More people will come out if we designate the event money as going to

a specific cause. We will post this issue and vote on it at the next meeting.

St Joseph Home

I would like to tell you a little more about the St Joseph Home facility in Westerville Ohio. I think it would be a great way to provide help for a worthy group, even though they may be located up the road a piece. I asked their administrator to provide some information:

The St. Joseph Home, Inc. is home to eight women with various levels of mental retardation and developmental disabilities. All residents require assistance 24 hours a day, 7 days a week in areas of personal care, homemaking, financial management, personal relationships, and medication administration. The St. Joseph Home, Inc. was founded by Sister Melanie Hannigan and Father Ralph Karl in 1976. The Home began operations on November 2, 1978. The Home was founded to provide a more normalized living situation for adult women with mental retardation and developmental disabilities.

In the mid 1970s, the policy of deinstitutionalization released thousands from an overburdened institutional system, but many vulnerable people were left without necessary supports. Sr. Melanie and Fr. Ralph Karl shared an interest in the field. With an unlit cigar in his mouth, he strongly suggested that Sr. Melanie should start a group home. She agreed to do so, but only with his help.

Many local residents expressed fear of the unknown and discomfort with the idea of people with mental retardation living in their community. But as the years went by, the community, as Sr. Melanie and Fr. Karl expected, came to welcome and support the Home and the people we serve. We are proud of our Mission and strive to fulfill it each day. Our residents, our "ladies" as we like to call them, are faced with the same challenges and struggles that we all face daily. A former staff member once wrote that "St. Joe's is a place where clients are people, caring is an advantage, and love is always a priority." This is the spirit that carries us forward.

The St. Joseph Home, Inc. is staffed 24 hours a day, every day. We strive to provide a living wage and a better-than-industry average benefits package to all full-time employees. However, these costs continue to rise forcing us to focus on more part-time employees. Choosing the best people to work at the

home is a priority as the best way to serve our women is to develop relationships with them.

The Individual Options Medicaid Waiver provides funding for all homemaker / personal care services our staff provide. We also receive some reimbursement from Franklin County for room and board and a portion of our administrative costs. Every dime we receive goes toward operational expenses making it extremely difficult to maintain a reserve for a "rainy day." The "rainy day" came for all of us with the recent downturn in the economy. We significantly cut or eliminated all non-essential expenses in areas that did not negatively affect the lives of our residents. We anticipate further cuts in our funding for 2010 but with far less fat to trim in our expenses.

As a home, it needs maintenance...perhaps more than normal. A constantly operating home with 8 residents and staff create a lot of wear and tear and funding shortages have pushed necessary renovations and maintenance projects to the backburner.

We are fortunate to have a certain Board member who can cut down trees that fall on our property for free, but not everything can get taken care of this way! During this period of financial difficulty, we have done everything we can to maintain the high quality of services for the women who live here, at the expense of replacing windows, repairing certain appliances, and the driveway.

Although we are dependent on Medicaid funding for our operations, we are eager to raise supplemental funding on our own. We have had successful theatre fundraisers in the past that not only bring in much needed dollars to our Home, but establish contacts with the community that benefit our ladies' lives in so many ways. With your assistance, we hope to raise enough money to bridge the shortfall in Medicaid funding while slowly building up our reserves. We also hope to establish new relationships with the community to enrich the lives of our residents.

Respect Life: March for Life

As of the writing of this article, there is still room on the bus to the March for Life in Washington, D.C., on January 21-22. This is a great trip and the cost actually went DOWN \$30 this year to \$150 per person. We will leave Seton about 6:30am Thursday morning and head directly to the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception for the Mass for Life with a stop for lunch along the way. If we did nothing else, this Mass would make the entire trip worthwhile. The entrance procession has so many Cardinals, Bishops, priests, deacons, and seminarians it takes 30 minutes! Great pro-Life homilies and talks from Cardinals and Bishops highlight the Mass. And seeing the vast numbers of young people there celebrating with us truly gives us hope for the future.

After Mass we reboard the bus and go to our hotel in downtown. We usually go to the youth Mass for Life Friday morning, but we could not get tickets this year so will have some free time in the morning to see some sights in DC. There is so much to see and do one morning is not enough! Around noon the March for Life rally will begin on the Mall. After many inspiring speeches, the March itself usually starts around 2:00 and we march to the Supreme Court building to show the justices and our elected representatives our opposition to abortion. The enthusiasm of the huge numbers of young people gathered has to be seen to be believed! After the march we get back on the bus for our trip home, with a stop for dinner about halfway, and arrive back at Seton after midnight.

This is a wonderful trip and every Knight should make it at some point. We really need additional Knights, their ladies, and kids to help fill the bus, so if there is any way you can join us, please contact Mike Croyle, Tim Bowie, or me IMMEDIATELY to sign up.

Meanwhile, the Senate passed its version of a Health Reform bill. This pro-abortion bill **REQUIRES** that taxpayer dollars be used to pay for abortions, even though Obama, Harry Reid, Nancy Pelosi, and other supporters of the bill deny it. The bill is now in committee to resolve differences between the Senate and House versions. The bill desperately needs an amendment similar to the pro-life Stupak-Pitts Amendment to the House Health Care bill that was passed by a large margin of the House.

Regardless of what you think of the overall bill and the need for health care reform, it is urgent that every Knight call or write both of your Senators and your Representative and ask them to include language in the final bill to prevent taxpayer support of abortion.

Perhaps next year we can make arrangements to combine our parish with another to remain involved.

In any case, please remember to pray for change, not just this month or on the anniversary of "Roe vs. Wade", but on a constant basis. No being ... from conception to death ... should be denied the "right to life".
